Please note: the Minor in Addiction Studies is <u>not</u> a minor program in Social Work. It is intended to provide students in helping disciplines, including social work, nursing, occupational therapy, education and psychology, with practical coursework in the field of addiction studies to fill a present need in the community.
The 18 credit hours required for the minor correspond with the 270 classroom hours necessary for CADC certification in Kentucky (per the 201 KAR 35:050 "Curriculum of Study" regulation, 1 academic credit hour = 15 classroom hours). Students choosing Living with AIDS (SW 385) as an elective satisfy all current content requirements. Classroom training represents only a portion of the CADC requirements and completion of the minor in no way ensures licensure.
Students must complete the following four required courses (12 credit hours). All required courses will be offered annually by the School of Social Work.

SW 330 Right, Wrong and It Depends: Applied Ethics for Helping Professionals (3 credit hours)
SW 410 Trauma and Addiction (3 credit hours)
SW 420 Addictions in Society (3 credit hours)
SW 435/535* Counseling and Addictions (3 credit hours)
Students must also complete 6 credit hours of elective courses related to the knowledge and skills necessary to perform alcohol and drug counselor competencies. At least three of the following elective courses will be offered annually by the School of Social Work. Students may also register to take addiction-related continuing education courses offered by the School of Social Work for academic (elective) credit.
